Installing ceiling fans cuts utility bill costs

Installing ceiling fans is a familiar recommendation when it comes to cooling a home or other room, but the fans, themselves, are not cooling units, said Bruce Snead, K-State Research and Extension residential energy specialist.

In moving the air, the fans produce a cooling effect that can reduce reliance on an air conditioning unit and yield a savings on overall utility costs, he said. He encourare occupied, but turning them off home.asp. when the rooms are unoccupied for

additional savings on utility bills. Reading the instructions for ceiling and other fans to adjust airflow is recommended, said Mr. Snead, who recently was appointed as director of extension energy programs at Kansas State University.

Kansas Legislature!

We started this year with a \$550 million deficit and tremendous uncertainty of what cuts were going to have to be made. On the 90th day of the session at 6 a.m., I voted for the budget that transformed that deficit into a \$50 million ending balance. The budget passed the House 69-55. Some did not vote for the budget because the cuts were too severe and some voted against it because the cuts were not severe enough.

By statute we were to have positive ending balance that is 7.5 percent of the \$6 billion State General Fund. We did not meet that statute and \$50 million is a pretty thin cushion. I am hoping that revenues continue to improve and that we are not faced with another deficit when we start the session next Janu-

A big concern in the state and Northwest Kansas is that each year when the legislature reconvenes and reviews the 2011 budget – the Rescission Budget – that more cuts will have to be made. If the revenues remain consistent there will not be any more cuts to the budget. This would allow us to work on streamlining government and still providing necessary services.

There were over \$3 million in savings when welfare recipients were required to have a valid social security number. Most of those were positions not currently being filled but the agencies were using those numbers in their budget.
