# Ordinance published defining storage units

Published in The Saint Francis Herald, St. Francis, Kansas, Thursday, June 2, 2011. ORDINANCE NO. 577

AN ORDINANCE DEFINING BUSINESS STORAGE UNITS AND ALLOWING FOR THEIR CONSTRUCTION AND/OR PLACEMENT WITHIN AREAS ZONED COMMER-CIAL, WITH CERTAIN REQUIREMENTS AND ESTABLISHING A NEW PARAGRAPH (C) TO SECTION 4-1201, A NEW SECTION 4-1204 AND THE RETITLING OF THE CURRENT SECTION 4-1204 TO 4-1205, ALL TO THE 2003 CODE OF THE CITY OF ST. FRANCIS, KANSAS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF ST. FRANCIS, KANSAS that Paragraph (c) of Section 4-1201 be adopted to read:

(c) Business Storage Unit shall mean a structure hereinafter further described in Section 4-1204, located on property in a commercially zoned area and owned or rented by the occupant and used by that occupant for the storage of inventory, equipment, machinery or goods used in the conduct of the business located on said property.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF ST. FRANCIS, KANSAS that Section 4-1204 be adopted and changed to read:

4-1204. PLACEMENT OF BUSINESS STORAGE UNIT. The construction and placement of business storage units shall be subject to the provisions of this Chapter and only allowed in areas zoned commercial and, further, subject to the following re-

(a) The securing of a building permit from the City.

(b) Placement upon and secured to a permanent pad and/or foundation as approved by the City and, if necessary, skirted.

(c) Of acceptable size and/or design, as determined by the City, so as to fit the

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF ST. FRANCIS, KANSAS, that the previous section 4-1204 be retitled to Section 4-1205

4-1205. CERTAIN USES AS STORAGE BUILDINGS OR STRUCTURES PROHIB-ITED. The placement or use of cargo containers, railroad cars, semi-trailers or trailers of any kind, originally designed and/or used for the transport of property shall not be allowed for storage units in the city limits.

These additions and amendments to Sections 4-1201, 4-1204 and 4-1205 shall be effective upon publication in the St. Francis Herald.

# **Across the County**

Horse owners urged to watch for signs of equine virus

Just as the spring horse show season moves into full swing, owners and trainers are encouraged to monitor their horses for symptoms of a potentially serious disease that is easily spread from horse to horse or through shared equipment.

The warning follows an outbreak of equine herpesvirus myeloencephalopathy at a competition in Utah April 29-May 8, in which horses from other states competed. Since then, the virus appears to have spread to several other states, according to a Kansas State University veterinarian.

As of May 18, a total of 14 confirmed or suspected cases have been reported in the United States, including five deaths. The states reporting confirmed or suspected cases by that date included

pected), Washington and Alberta,

There have been no confirmed or suspected cases reported in Kansas so far (as of May 18), said Beth Davis, associate professor of clinical sciences in K-State's College of Veterinary Medicine.

"Equine herpes virus 1, or EHV-1, is one of a large group of DNA viruses causing potentially serious disease in horses and other species," Ms. Davis said. "Equine herpes virus-1 can cause different forms of disease, including abortion in mares, respiratory infection and neurological symptoms. The most recent outbreaks have involved the EHV-1 respiratory/ neurological form of the virus, or equine herpesvirus myeloencephalopathy (EHM)."

medicine and surgery. The virus also can spread for a short time through the air within the stall and stable environment. Horses infected with the neuro-

logic strain of equine herpes virus-1 might have a fever as well as nasal discharge, incoordination, hind-end weakness, recumbency, lethargy, urine dribbling and diminished tail tone.

herpes virus-1 vaccines that have been proven to prevent against the development of equine herpesvirus myeloencephalopathy, she said. She recommends that horse owners contact their local veterinarian or the K-State Large Animal Desk (785-532-5700) to discuss potential vaccine recommendations that may be implemented to help limit the severity of disease, should their horse be-


"If horse owners notice that a horse develops fever, respiratory or neurological signs, they should call us or their local veterinarian and not move the horse or horses in the immediate area," Davis said. "We are also urging horse owners in this situation to alert those who have horses in the adjacent vicinity to cease all movement in or out of the facility until a diagnosis is confirmed by testing. If horses are exposed and then travel to a new stable or show, the infection can spread to other horses at the new location." Davis is encouraging horse owners who have questions or notice such symptoms to contact their veterinarian or K-State's Large Animal Desk at 785-532-5700. 
