Mike Day, county attorney, said he had reviewed some papers from Bob Medina with the Kansas Department of Health and Environment which involves a grant to help clean up the property. There were still some questions and the council thought it was important to get the answers in writing. They noted that in the past, there had been several false starts with Mr. Medina and the Health and Environment department.

The council asked Landenberger, superintendent, if he thought the city crew could do the required "in-kind" labor or if it would need to be contracted out. Mr. Landenberger thought that it would be better to remove the debris in the fall. There was also the problem of where to take the debris. Mr. Day will contact the county to see if it was possible to take it to the landfill or what the options would


