Commissioners listen to complaints about hummer

The Cheyenne County Commissioners heard complaints about the Hummer which was recently acquired from the Army by the sheriff's department. After all the discussion, the instances named. commissioners agreed that they were OK with the acquisition.

Rodney Neitzel, St. Francis, started out by telling the commissioners how thankful he and his family were of the county's emergency system. However, he was concerned about the increases in his taxes, both on his personal property and his businesses.

He said he thought that the Hummer was something that the county government didn't need. It was pointed out that the Hummer had been something that the sheriffs, including Troy Gardner, had applied for. The vehicle is an Army surplus and only counties that qualify are eligible to get one. It was free with the exception of the cost for the government's paperwork which is 5 percent of the cost of the vehicle. In the county's case, it was \$1,700. The shipping cost \$1,000. The tag cost \$25. There was still a question on insurance but, since the Army still owns it, all the insurance necessary was liability.

Mr. Neitzel said there would still be the cost of lights, lettering and equipping the vehicle including typical maintenance.

Hummer, the The commissioners said, will be used by all county emergency departments. Mr. Neitzel said it was nice to be prepared but the county couldn't be prepared in all instances. For instance, it would be nice to have boats if the Republican River were to flood. If there is a blizzard, why can't private vehicles be used in rescuing people? And, why can't the state highway department be contacted?

The vehicle will go where other vehicles, even 4-wheel drive pickups have trouble going, the commissioners said. Recently,

The money used for the Hummer expenses was already in the sheriff's budget. Mr. Neitzel said he didn't think the government should put money anyway. Since it is the taxpayer's money, they, the taxpayers, should be able to save it the way they want to.

It comes down to money and where it is best spent, Mr. Neitzel said. For instance, when the tornado siren went off recently, we, at the Hilltop Market, could not hear it. There are all sorts of ways things can be done for public safety.
