Before the crew had time to react the cruiser was below the surface.

Captain Swenson wasn't the only notable sailor to perish with the Juneau. Five boys from Waterloo, Iowa, were serving under him. The Sullivan brothers were among the 685 Americans who lost their lives with the sinking


