## Car show set for this Saturday


until 1 p.m. The coffee is free.

Pete Jensen is the creator of this

unique pickup. As the creator, he said he had no plans, only what he envisioned in his head and, even then, it was what was going to fit together. However, what didn't fit to begin with, he made it fit.

Starting with the front of the

rat rod, the bumper, fender and radiator was a 1927 Dodge. He purchased the parts from Martin Hilt. Note that there is a cob fork covering the radiator.

The cab was a 1937 Dodge. He said when he was delivering his

first load of cement, many years ago, he saw the cab sitting in the pasture. He tracked down the owner, Clinton Schlepp, who gave him the cab.

## Students bring home first place

St. Francis journalism students brought back the Class 1A Sweepstakes title in the Kansas Scholastic Press Association State Contest in Lawrence on Saturday, May 5. Eighteen St. Francis Community High School journalism students competed. The final results in the 1A Class reflected that St. Francis students tripled their nearest competitor's score.

"Sixty-one judges sifted through 1,387 entries to award first, second, third placings as well as three honorable mentions in Classes 1A/2A, 3A/4A and 5A/6A," Jeff Brown, Kansas Scholastic Press Association executive director, said. "Classes are separated only as a means of determining sweepstakes winners in each class, but not individual winners."

The following individuals placed in their respective categories: Editing - first, Tilyn Bell, News Writing - first, Hayley Brown, Photo Illustration - first Zach Gienger, Yearbook Copy Writing - first Randee Grover, News Sports Writing - second Clarice Neitzel, Yearbook Copy Writing - third Mariah Beikman, News Page Design - honorable mention, Jon Butler, Yearbook Layout - honorable mention, Allison Grice, Cutline Writing - honorable mention, Ross Nicklos, Headline Writing - honorable mention, Derek Queen.

"I am extremely proud of these student journalists," said Brenda Day, journalism adviser. "Without the support and encouragement of the administration, our students would not experience success at this level."

## Doctor receives teaching award

The Kansas Academy of Family Physicians has selected Mary Beth Miller, MD, a family physician at Cheyenne County Clinic in St. Francis, as the 2012 Exemplary Teaching Award in the volunteer category. She is a volunteer clinical assistant professor at the University of Kansas School of Medicine-Wichita; Kansas Primary Care Research Network participant; clinical preceptor, Wichita State University Physician Assistant Program; and clinical preceptor, Fort Hays State Nurse Practitioner Program.

The Exemplary Teaching Awards recognize family medicine faculty members in Kansas who have demonstrated exemplary teaching skills or have

developed and implemented innovative new teaching models or programs. Medical students, residents and peers nominate the family physician teachers.

Dr. Miller says she has always liked to "figure things out." She enjoyed science and knew in college that she wanted to go to medical school but doubted herself because she felt that coming from a small town in Nebraska of population 420 meant she wouldn't be "smart" enough. So she settled for being a medical technologist; but the desire for medical school never left her.

She finally completed medical school after being a med tech for 12 years.
