Very few sweet potato growdays to mature after planting the ers do it that way anymore. If the local garden center guy doesn't carry them, then you can order a dozen plants and they will be shipped to you at the proper planting time. Proper planting time in this area is now. Expect to pay about \$12 to \$15 for a dozen plants. Planting soil should be worked very deeply because the tubers will be large and need good soil as they expand. Many gardeners still set out their plants into a previously formed mound, approximately 6-inches high and a foot wide. You really don't

About half the crop is used for pig feed, which seems kind of a shame unless you prefer bacon to eat rather than sweet potatoes. New Zealanders eat the most sweet potatoes, averaging about 15 pounds per person per year.

You have many varieties of sweet potatoes to choose from, but Georgia Jet seems to be the favorite around here. Beauregard and Centennial are close behind. Vardaman is a newer variety that is gaining popularity because it is a bush type of plant ... a good space saver.
