



Up for election are the county commissioner Districts 2 and 3, sheriff, magistrate judge, register of deeds, clerk, treasurer and attorney.

As of Wednesday, those filing include:

Election officer, Terry Miller, said as of Wednesday, there

is only one race. Brett Poling and incumbant Andy Beikman have filed for commissioner in District 3. Incumbant Dale Patton has filed as an Independent so will not be on the ballot until the general election.

Others filing are: Karan Thadani, county attorney; Dolores Jenik, treasurer; Melissa Tabor, register of deeds; Robert Van Allen, magistrate judge; Cody Beeson, sheriff; and Terry Miller, clerk.

All candidates are Republicans with the exception of Mr. Patton.
