Owner and editor win national newspaper awards

Kevin Bottrell won second place in feature writing in the National Newspaper Association's Better Newspapers Contest, for a story he wrote last year while editor of the Colby Free Press.

The contest, held each year to newspapers, drew 1,954 entries from daily and weekly newspapers, with 525 awards won by 135 papers.

The article – which appeared in the paper Feb. 11, 2011 – chronicled the experiences of Charles Cook, a Colby man who was a technical sergeant in the Army Air Corps during World War II.

"Mr. Cook came in to see me one day," Bottrell said. "We got to talking about his experiences during the war. It was fascinating how clear his memories were 67 years later. I have a particular interest in World War II, and I make a point to interview anyone I can who was a veteran."

Cook, who was the flight engineer and manned one of the machine gun turrets on a B-17 bomber, recalled his missions over
