Service Agency to certify alfalfa and native grass is Nov. 15, and the deadline to certify 2013 wheat acres is Dec. 15. In an effort to use the producers' time effectively, Farm Service Agency personnel are asking producers to call the office immediately to schedule an appointment to complete certifying 2013 wheat and alfalfa acres by the Nov.

Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program producers are required to provide production evidence of their NAP crops such as alfalfa, cane, oats, millet, etc. by the certification date of each covered

The deadline for the United States crop, regardless of any possible fil-Department of Agriculture, Farm ing of a Notice of Loss. Failure to report production by the deadline will result in a reduced approved yield used for subsequent years. Approved yields are used in determining the scope of any possible crop losses when filing a Notice of Loss and Application for payment. This means for those having 2012 NAP coverage on alfalfa, their 2012 alfalfa production needs to be reported by Nov. 15.
