Support Constitutional Amendment -Vote YES on the watercraft amendment November 6.

Constitutional amendment that - if passed - will allow for fairer taxation of watercraft (boats) and make Kansas watercraft taxation competitive with surrounding states.

Property taxes on watercraft in Kansas are so high that they impede boat ownership, limiting families' opportunity for wholesome water recreation. Compared to surrounding states, Kansas watercraft property taxes are so high that many Kansans register their boats in neighboring states, so Kansas counties lose property tax revenue. The hight tax rates also reduce in-state boat sales, impacting our marinas, boat dealers, and reducing state sales tax revenue.

The legislature showed bipartisan, overwhelming support - 121 to 2 in the House and 40 to 0 in the Senate - for placing this amendment on the ballot. The amendment may by difficult to understand because the ballot includes the entire article of the constitution that is affected, not just the change. The only change is the addition of the words "and watercraft." Adding just those two words will give the legislature the opportunity to create a fairer tax treatment of watercraft.

This change is good for Kansas and Kansas families, and I encourage you to vote YES on the amendment.



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
