School board starts looking for teachers

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Three teachers, one principal and the counselor will be leaving the St. Francis Schools at the end of the school year.

At the Thursday St. Francis Board of Education meeting, the board talked about replacements and how to shift positions for school next year. Positions vacated are Scott "Hoagie" Carmichael, principal; Julie Wolters, sixth grade; Lyn Wiley, vo ag; Mary Beikman, art; and Ward Cassidy, counselor.

We are losing some good people, said Rob Schiltz, superintendent.

Mr. Carmichael's position will be combined with David Morrow, now the English teacher, assuming the duties of seventh through 12th grade principal. Mr. Schiltz will take on the principal duties at the grade school, moving his office to the room north of the cafeteria. Traci Neitzel, his secretary, will also move to the grade

Mr. Morrow's English position had been posted and there had been two ap-

plicants. There were several applicants for the sixth grade position. A contract had been offered to Tiffany Poet from Flagler, Colo., to fill the voca-

Mr. Schiltz said she appeared to be a good

fit for the school.

Mrs. Beikman's resignation had been received the day before the board meeting. Mr. Schiltz asked the board what their position was on hiring a full-time art teacher to fill the position? (Mrs. Beikman was a full-time teacher.) He suggested that, if the board wanted, they could maybe share an art teacher with Cheylin. However, after discussion, Derrick Tice, board member, said that, even though the position might be hard to fill, he thought that it should remain a full-time teacher. Ed Marin, board member, agreed, nothing that Mrs. Beikman might be hard to replace because of the work her students produced.

Mr. Schiltz said he would post the posi-

tion the next day. The board discussed the use of the little church now being used as the art room. The new art location had been established because of Mrs. Beikman's allergies in the other art rooms. Mr. Schiltz said the old art room in the grade school would probably be used again.
