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Woman pleads not guilty; trial set for April 21

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The trial date has been set for a local woman who has been accused of murder in St. Francis.

Leanna Windell, 43, was arraigned in Cheyenne County District Court on Friday, Nov. 8.

Windell pled not guilty to the charge of premeditated murder in the first degree in the death of Brad Figgins. Figgins, 45, was found in the basement of his home the evening of April 3, 2013, with injuries to his head. He was taken by ambulance to the hospital, and later pronounced dead. The penalty for that charge is 25 years to life in

Windell also pled not guilty to two counts of theft, class A misdemeanors. One count was for the Figgens home. The second count of theft was for Figgins' personal effects, valued at less than adequate time to prepare. \$1,000. The penalty, if found guilty,

is up to 12 months of jail time for each count.

During the preliminary trial, the prosecution called two expert witnesses to testify to Figgins' cause of death. They called three additional witnesses to testify to the whereabouts of Windell on April 3. The defense did not call any

Judge Scott Showalter said that Windell will be given a trial by a jury of her peers in Cheyenne County. Jury questionnaires were to be agreed upon by the prosecution and defense, and sent out as soon as

Windell waived the right to a speedy trial in order to give her court appointed defense lawyer, Charles Peckham, more time to prepare.
