Commissioners discuss sheriff vehicle replacement schedule

karen.k@nwkansas.com At the Friday commissioners meeting, the Cheyenne County Commissioners started at 8 a.m. instead of an hour later. Congressman Tim Huelskamp had planned to hold a town meeting in St. Francis at 8 a.m., however a snow storm during the night caused snow-packed roads and he was unable to make the appointment.

Cody Beeson, sheriff, and Tony Rodriguez, undersheriff, were back with the costs of vehicles for the department. At the last meeting, the sheriff said the department could possibly purchase new vehicles through the General Equipment Reserve program.

Sheriff Beeson said this year, he had returned \$37,000 to the general fund. He has two vehicles he wants to change out of because of the miles they have on them: a 2005 Ford F-150 with 148,000, and a 2006 Ford F-150 with 171,000 miles. Both are in need of repairs.

131,000 miles, and it also needs some work, however, this was one which he wasn't suggesting be replaced.

The sheriff said he would like to start a vehicle replacement schedule. His suggestion for replacing the 2005 and 2006 Fords would be to purchase two 2014 Dodge Ram 1500 pickups through the General Equipment Reserve program for \$24,131 each. Dealers, Mr. Beeson said, can't get a pickup for 8th grade published this price.
