

Glenn 'Buster' Edward Schneider II

August 18, 1950 – February 17, 2014

Glenn 'Buster' Edward Schneider II was born on Aug. 18, 1950 to Glenn Edward Schneider and Doris 'Dottie' (Felzien) Schneider in St. Francis.

Buster married Sherry Brunswig in 1974, and to this union three beautiful girls were born: StarAnna Sue, Julie Renae, and Malinda Bell.

He graduated from St. Francis Community High School and was a supreme athlete in sports including wrestling, football and track.

Buster served in the Army and was in active duty during the Vietnam War from Feb. 20, 1971 to April 2, 1971. He was honorably discharged and awarded the Purple Heart due to his courageous acts while serving on the front line.

Buster was known for his work on oil rigs, as a farm hand, custom hay stacking, brick layer, pig farmer, and the owner of the bar and grill in St. Francis named "The Wood Shed".

Buster died on Feb. 17, 2014, at the age of 63 in his home in Wauneta, Neb. Services were held on Feb. 21 at the Redeemer Evangelical Lutheran Church in Wauneta, Neb. Songs were sung by Joseph

Augusta and Jody Schneider.

After the services, family and friends of Buster attended a military burial with a 21 gun salute and Taps was played.

Buster is survived by his daughters: StarAnna Elijah and husband Jason of Tallmadge, Ohio; Julie Stebbins and husband Aaron of Liberty, Mo.; and Malinda McBee and husband Ross of Missouri. He was blessed with five grandchildren: DeAndrea, Bryce, Kaden, Waylon and Emma.
