## Change of voting districts agreed on by school board

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The St. Francis' Board of Education voted Thursday to pass a resolution changing the structure of the voting districts for the school board. St. Francis community members will vote on a resolution to be able to choose school board members that are general representatives, rather than district-specific,

At the school board meeting on Thursday, Superintendent Rob Schiltz said that that the board asked him to investigate the procedure for changing the current election plan to one in which all board members are elected atlarge following last year's elec-

Currently, the Board of Education members are elected using 'Voting Plan B," which states, "All electors, who are otherwise qualified according to law, and who reside in the member district may vote in the primary election for the member positions of such member districts and for the atlarge member position. All electors, who are otherwise qualified according to law, and who reside in the school district may vote I the general election for all filled."

are currently elected using a three member district method which states, "The school district is divided into three member districts, two board members are elected from each member district and one board member is elected at-large."

All this can be a bit confusing, and many residents of St. Francis do not know where the district lines are drawn in any case. Opening up the election allows for more people to run, and does not limit well-qualified volunteers based on where they are living, said Superintendent Schiltz.

The board proposes that the plan be changed to "Voting Plan A," which states, "All electors, who are otherwise qualified according to law, and who reside in the school district, may vote in both primary and general election for all member positions."

This would change the above three member district method to the at-large method, which states, "The school district is not divided into any member districts and all board members are elected at-
