A feral cat was identified with rabies after it bit a St. Francis resident. #### What is rabies

Rabies is a disease of the virus. It results from an exposure to the saliva of an animal infected with rabies. In the United States, rabies among humans is rare, although anyone can get it after an animal has rabies is to kill it an exposure to a rabid animal. It is spread when the virus in an animal's saliva, or other open cut, wound, mouth, or eyes.
