# Hospital board discusses services, costs and patient care

amiller@nwkansas.com The new interim administrator for Cheyenne County Hospital, Les Lacy, gave a detailed account of how Great Plains Health Alliance has saved the hospital over \$140,000 in the last year. Mr. Lacy also brought up the idea of mission versus margin with the board, and a

long discussion took place. Mr. Lacy, vice president for regional operations with Great Plains Health Alliance, is serving as the interim administrator until a replacement is found. He said he anticipates this will be for about three months. Mr. Lacy told the board that other management companies would not do what he is doing, and it saves the hospital about \$10,000 a month. In addition, a health insurance holiday earned with the insurance company through Great Plains saved the hospital \$33,000 in December. 


