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Kansas went without power for of up to 80 miles per hour and hours, some over a day, after baseball-size hail. In Atwood, a massive storm system swept there were reports of up to 200 through the area. Huge tree trees being blown down, with 89 branches, downed power lines mile per hour wind gusts. Saturday evening, storm warnings started rolling in for Cheyenne and surrounding counties. Large hail, severe thunderstorm and possible tornado warnings were sent out, and off in the distance a the sunny skies started turning ominously black.

When the storm hit, it brought with it winds in excess of 70 miles per hour, large hail and heavy rain. around quarter size, depending on where in town it was seen. In Goodland, there were reports of golf ball or tennis ball-size hail.

service were equally impressive. On the border in Kanorado, grain Residents throughout northwest bins were leveled by high winds part of Saturday evening.

In St. Francis, large tree limbs Beginning at about 6 p.m. fell, blocking some streets. At Riverside, a tree was uprooted by the damaging winds. There have been reports of several center pivot systems being overturn. Roof and outbuilding damage has been considerable due to hail damage. There is also significant damage to crops south of Wheeler and other areas throughout the

The power went out in St. Hail reports in St. Francis were Francis at approximately 7:30 p.m. Dan Blair, in charge of the city power supply at the time of the storm, said that the power was out for about 7 hours. The city was able to get power restored on their own.
