New emergency medical director talks about plans

Reid Raile, county emergency medical service director, met with the Cheyenne County Commissioners on Tuesday, June 17. One of his concerns is making sure there is sufficient personnel to cover emergencies. He had a "sustainability plan for staffing" ready for the commissioners to review.

First on the list is holding a first responder class from September through November. Dee Wilson will be the instructor, teaching the class for \$2,250, however, in the end with a repayment, the commissioners will need to pay \$1,050 this time.

Mr. Raile is also looking in to an education incentive grant which the state of Kansas provides for Rural Frontier Communities. The grant allows each student \$320.

He would also like to see each student receive a local incentive grant of \$150 which pays for books

If the student does not meet the service obligation, or drops out of the course before it is completed, the student will be required to repay the full amount. If the student academically fails or is denied to take

the certification exam, the student will be required to pay back 50 percent of the grant. If the student does not pass certification after all the allowed attempts. the student is not required to repay any of the grant Raile said he is hoping that the grants will

encourage students to become emergency medical Mr. Raile, who is also the courthouse's

information technology support tech, said Scott Houtman, the new deputy county clerk, has agreed to be the primary support tech. Mr. Raile will be the "resource."

In other business:

• The county ambulance service gave up only one transfer to Hays emergency medical services and that was over the Father's Day weekend.

• Call volume for the month of May, he said, was below average. St. Francis had eight calls; Bird City had two calls; and there were six transfers.

• The district court's computer server is being replaced. Mr. Raile asked that the emergency medical service department be allowed to have it. The commissioners agreed to the request.
