
Sharks swim in qualifying meet

Organic certification funds now available

Kansas farmers who currently use organic production practices or would like to pursue organic certification are encouraged to apply for cost share funds from the Kansas Department of Agriculture.

The program, funded by the 2014 Farm Bill, is administered though the USDA Agricultural W-9 form. Marketing Service. The certification or recertification. Under the state's agreement with USDA, they are eligible for up to 75 percent of the cost of their organic certification, up to \$750, for certification occurring between Oct. 1, 2013 to Sept. 30, 2014, as long as funds remain.

"This is a great opportunity for farmers to achieve this certification at a reduced cost," said Annarose Hart, marketing specialist with the Kansas Department of Agriculture.
