"If a team has enough swimmers in an age group you may have relays boys and girls. Then if you have an odd number of boys and girls you may run a mixed relay.

"Sometimes we even can put teams together to run exhibition relays during the season to give each swimmer a chance to try a relay.

"You can not run exhibition races at the league meet because of the length of the meet.
