Featuring over 1,500 contestants from 39 states, four Canadian Provinces and Australia, the National High School Finals is the world's largest rodeo. In addition to competing for over \$125,000 in prizes contestants will also be vying for more than \$170,000 in college scholarships and the chance to be named the National High School Rodeo national champion. To earn this title, contestants must finish in the top 20 after two going on to Sunday's final championship

This year, the Sunday championship performance will be televised nationally on the Outdoor Channel Network's weekly "Rodeo Round-Up" series. It is scheduled to air Aug. 14 and Aug. 21 at 8 p.m. eastern and will re-air the following Sunday at 8 p.m. eastern and the following Monday at 12 p.m. eastern (check local listings).
