Farmers spouses added to program

Farm program payment limitations weren't changed in the 2002 Farm Bill, but because of other changes in the law some producers may hit the \$40,000 payment limit for the first time this year. The changes — higher direct payment rates and the addition of soybeans as a contract commodity — may lead producers to add their spouses as joint operators when describing their operations to the Cheyenne County Farm Service Agency. According to Angie Bock, County

Executive Director for the Cheyenne County Farm Service Agency, many farming operations involve both a husband and wife who could qualify as separate "persons," but, for various reasons, only one spouse has been the program participant and payment recipient. In these cases, both spouses were part of the farming operation as of April 1, but the farming operation was not necessarily represented to the Farm Service Agency as being comprised of both spouses.

Producers can normally add qualified spouses as program participants before April 1 each year. Since the 2002 Farm Bill was signed into law on May 13 and the new commodity payment rates were announced after that, Director Bock said Farm Service Agency is giving eligible producers until Aug. 1 to add qualified spouses as program participants, effective for 2002.

Director Bock cautioned that payment eligibility and payment limitation determinations that apply for 2002, apply to all 2002 payments and benefits, including those already made this year under the 1996 Farm Bill. If based on a revised 2002 "person" determination, the original spouse would not be eligible for 100 percent of the payments already received. The amount of the overpayment must be refunded before the revised determination can be applied.
