Improvements made at Cheyenne Theater

The Cheyenne Theater is providing better, more recent movies since the committee changed movie brokers about two years ago but people may not realize that there are changes which may not be as apparent.

Bob Bixler and Kelly Frewen, Theater Committee members, reported that in the last year, a new speaker system was installed. Now, the audience will have sub-woofer, center, left and right channel speakers which enhances the old system. Mr. Bixler pointed out that with the new sound system, it is like the person on the screen is speaking directly to the audience.

"In the past, all of the sounds were mixed and came out in just two speakers," Mr. Frewen said.
