More about the Wheeler store When the Orlando Post Office closed in the fall of 1888, the mail was sent to the new town of Wheeler. Captain Bridgford put up the first store, a little blue shack. The next and only other known location for the Wheeler Store was in the building which had once housed the United Brethren Church. With the erection of the new brick schoolhouse in Wheeler, the old frame school was attached to the north side of this building to enlarge the store.

Walter Stalder and Isaac Schild ran a merchandise business in the building until it was sold to Homer Follett. Sr. and his wife Hattie in 1907. After just three years, the Folletts traded the store to Melvin and Stella Archer
