### Kenneth D. Dautel

July 16, 1925 - July 27, 2002 Kenneth D. Dautel, 77, Goodland, Kan., died Saturday, July 27, 2002, at Goodland Regional Medical Center.

He was born July 16, 1925, at Elmo, the son of Alice S. (Leckron) and Albert M. Dautel. The family moved to Sherman County in 1930 to a farm located southeast of Goodland. In 1942, he graduated from Edson High School. He served his country in the United States Army during the later part of World War II.

On March 25, 1947, he and Merna Jean Berry were married in Goodland. Kenneth was a jack of all trades. He and Merna ran a gas station in Edson, and then he farmed with his father and drove a truck for Short and Son in the early 1950s. After finishing auctioneer school, he worked as an auctioneer in several sale barns around the area. In First United Methodist Church in the early 1960s, he was a partner in owning the Stratton, Colo., and Goodland Livestock Commissions. He helped start the KXXX Auction Block that promoted the sales around the surrounding area. Kenneth and Merna milked cows, raised hogs and had a cow/calf operation. They raised Funeral Home, Goodland. wheat, corn, sugar beets, alfalfa and

In the mid-1970s, he and Merna at the First Christian Church in St. moved to their current residence. They ran a skating rink, which they enjoyed very much, especially since their kids helped with running it. They owned Dautel Sales, an auction company that held auctions all over the country.

Kenneth liked kids and was involved in many activities that involved kids. He especially enjoyed being a 4-H leader, helping with animal projects and the fishing clinics. He supplied the livestock for the Junior Rodeo for years. He was a very caring person, and he loved his children and grandchildren. His hobbies included fishing and

taking care of animals. His memberships included Veterans

of Foreign Wars - Lowell Coleman Post 1133, American Legion Post 117, and Elks Lodge 1528, all of Goodland.

Preceding him in death were his parents, one brother Charles and one sister Ruth Berringer.


