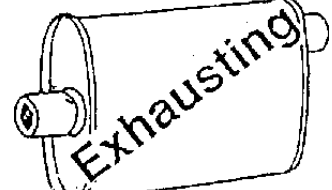

Annual scholarship program announced

The Dane G. Hansen Foundation will make 188 scholarships available in five categories to students in 26 northwest Kansas counties for the 2002-03 academic year.

The awards offered include: Eight Leaders of Tomorrow scholarships with annual stipends of \$5,000, renewable for three additional years for a total of \$20,000 per student. Satisfactory progress must be maintained each year.

Thirty Hansen Scholar awards with stipends of \$3,000, renewable for one additional year providing satisfactory progress is maintained.

Ten Community College scholarships with stipends of \$2,000, renewable for one additional year providing satisfactory progress is maintained.

Sixty Hansen Student non-renewable awards of \$2,000.

Eighty non-renewable Vocational Education awards of \$1,500.

Students planning to enter the competition for Leader of Tomorrow, Hansen Scholar or Hansen Student awards must register at their school and take the qualifying test at locations to be announced. Information on all scholarships has been sent to qualifying area schools. Tentative test dates will be Oct. 7 and Oct. 8.

To qualify for taking a Hansen Scholarship test, the student should have been an active participant in school, extra curricular and community activities; have displayed good citizenship, leadership, and moral

integrity, and be proficient in written and verbal skills. The student's grade point average must be 3.50 or above on a 4.0 scale.

Those interested in applying for a Community College award must be graduates of a high school in the 26 counties of the Northwest Kansas Hansen area, be completing their Community College work with a 3.0 average or better and possess good character and leadership qualities. They will not be required to take the test, but should complete the application and provide a supporting official transcript.

Applicants for Vo-Tech scholarships must complete the application form available at their school. The Scholarship Committee will be interested in the student's character, activities, goals, and six-semester grades, but will not require applicants to take the qualifying test.

Students in Cheyenne county are among those eligible for Hansen scholarships.

County Health Talk

E. Coli bacteria can be a serious disease, but it's a disease that is preventable. People should cook ground beef until it is brown all the way through. The regulations for food establishments say that ground beef is to be cooked to an internal temperature of at least 155 degrees Fahrenheit. Proper cooking will destroy the E. Coli bacteria.

Although E. Coli does not become airborne, it is possible for the bacteria to be transmitted from person to person from unwashed hands. People should always wash their hands for at least 20 seconds with soap and warm running water before and after cooking and eating, and when leaving the rest room. People who do not wash after using the toilet may carry the bacteria on their hands.

E. Coli may also be passed from raw meats to any surface. Plates, utensils

and cutting boards, which have had raw meats, should therefore not be used for serving food until they have been washed and sanitized.

As is the case with many other illnesses, older persons, young children and people with compromised immune systems are those who are most likely to become seriously ill if exposed to E. Coli.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment and local health agencies actively investigate all reported cases of E. Coli and are continuing to watch for cases in Kansas. Since January, there have been 11 confirmed cases of E. Coli reported in the state. One case has been linked to the recent national outbreak investigation of E. Coli related to eating recalled ground beef.

So, remember to wash your hand and cook meat properly to stay healthy.

Genealogy Korner

Almost every week we learn more about our early Cheyenne County people. This week we heard from the Kepferle family.

Joseph Paul Kepferle, wife, Alice and daughter Helen Kathleen came to Cheyenne County in 1878, but after the tragic loss of their only child on May 29, 1878, they evidently returned to family in eastern Kansas where their next child George is believed to have been born in November 1879.

They left the infant and their name in this unsettled area. A post office was applied for by Andrew V. P. Day, an attorney. The Day brothers, Andrew and Samuel were here about the

same time, but these families also did not stay long. The second white child born in Cheyenne County was the son of Samuel Day, in October 1879. But the family left shortly after that because the Heaton family moved into their house on the ranch in October 1879.

The post office Kepferle was approved in 1880, with George T. Dunn as postmaster, after the application sent in by A. V. P. Day was not approved. The Kepferle post office continued until 1883, and after that even the name Kepferle disappeared from the maps of Cheyenne County.

According to our early history, the first white people to winter here were cowboys during the winter of 1875. Shortly after that, there were a few families and men living here to add their names to the 1880 census. These were Dunn, Brenaman, Leach, Graham, Thompson, Holcomb and Bateham, three of these men had brought their families here. At his time Lucius Heaton was here alone, and returned to Iowa in October 1880 to bring his family to the beautiful area on Big Timber near Kepferle. The Heaton family moved onto the old Samuel Day ranch. At this time it is not known if there was a relationship between the Heaton and the Days. When Heaton's left Iowa they sold their land to a Day family.

As far as we know now, Helen Kathleen Kepferle was the earliest burial in Cheyenne County. There were several Native American burials, but their names will never be known.

If you have questions about any early county family, please let me know. I may have the family on file.
