The elevator business grew to become the McDougal-Sager Grain Company of Bird City, Atwood, and Beardsley. Bob retired in 1989 from the elevator. He continued to do some farming until health reasons forced retirement in 1995.

Throughout his children's teenage years he could be found on the road to many school activities. In later years, home games were still an important activity for the Sager's.

Bob's accomplishments included being a former Bird City High School Board member, past mayor and councilman of Bird City, the Bird City Community Club, the American Legion Post 352 for 56 years, and the Masonic temple of McDonald, then St. Francis receiving his 50-year pin. 





