In the forth quarter M. Johnson ran a 33-yard touchdown which made the score 34-6, M. Johnson then had a 8yard run that brought the score 34-12. To finish the game Cole Williams made a 2-yard run for the final touch-



The defense was led by Knapp making 13 tackles, with Wilson following his lead to bring down an additional 12 tackles, Moyer and J. Simmonds each totaled another 9 tackles each.




