Signing the contract with the construction company doing the work for the Cheyenne County Clinic in St. Francis was the main reason for the early Thursday morning meeting. No new cases of virus reported in county

Dr. Judy Baxter and Susan Roelfs, county health nurse, said no new cases of West Nile virus has been fund in Cheyenne County.

Two weeks ago, Gary Cooper, St. Francis, had a 2-year-old gelding which was diagnosed with West Nile but, as of Tuesday, he reported his horse appears to be improving each day.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment has received confirmation that specimens from six people in Kansas submitted to the Centers for Disease Control for West Nile virus testing were negative. Several states including Missouri, Iowa, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Texas have reported confirmed human cases of the virus.

The virus has been confirmed in horses, mules, birds and/or mosquitoes in a total of 63 Kansas counties including Cheyenne, Decatur, Logan, Norton and Thomas counties.

only known method of transmission to animals or humans. People cannot get the disease from horses or from the birds carrying the virus but the Centers for Disease Control is studying whether transmission of the virus can occur through blood transfusions or organ transplants.

In humans, West Nile virus usually causes mild symptoms but does not generally require medical treatment. In rare cases, patients with encephalitis may require hospitalization and death can occur in very severe cases. Human testing for the disease is generally recommended only for hospitalized patients with severe symptoms and medical treatment does not change for those
