Indians win again

Again this week, the St. Francis football team engaged in action with a competitor they had never met before, South Park High School, and as happened last week against Bridgeport, the Indians dominated the game both offensively and defensively.

In the contest played in Fairplay, Colo., on Saturday afternoon, the Sainty offense put 46 points on the board in the first three quarters while holding South Park scoreless. Only in the final period did South Park gain 16 points on a field goal and two touch-

The 2-0 Indians now move into Northwest Kansas League action by traveling to Goodland Friday evening to meet the Cowboys. This is the third game on the road for the players but fans can look ahead to the home opener against the Oakley Plainsmen at Greene Field on Friday, Sept. 27. Kickoff time is 7:30 p.m.


