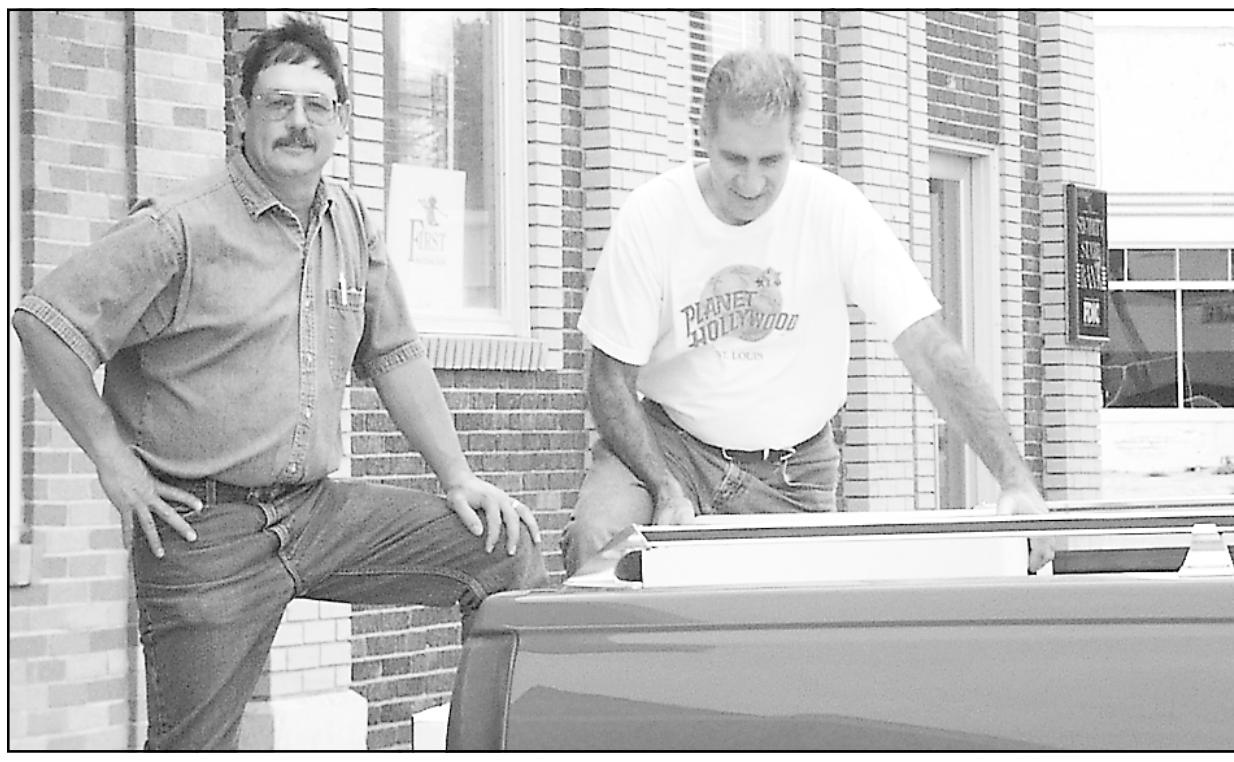


NewBank opens Monday
