


At the Game

First league game finishes in win for Oakley on Friday

The Indians could move the ball, they actually rushed 275 yards during the evening, but they just could not manage to get into the end zone on most of their drives. As a result the Oakley Plainsmen took home a 12-8 Northwest Kansas League football

"Oakley is a good team," Coach Tim Lambert said. "They played hard and didn't have as many mistakes."

Fumbles played a part in the Indians losing the ball, stopping more than one successful drive down the field.

"It's discouraging to lose a game we could have won," Coach Lambert said. "A lot will depend on how we handle

Sainty scored in the third quarter, which was also the best quarter for the Indians as they came out of the locker room with renewed determination. Oakley had one touchdown in the second quarter and one in the fourth when they overcame the Indian's 8-6 lead. As a result of the Plainsmen using the clock efficiently, Sainty was left with little time to turn the game around

"It was a good high school football game." Coach Lambert said. "After looking at the film we felt that in certain aspects this was the best game we have had. The offensive line played well and the offensive backs and blocking executions were good."

Sainty opened the game on offense and was making their ground game work when it was stopped by one of the few passing attempts of the evening ending up in the wrong hands. The Plainsman runner was making head way down the field until stopped by Kyle Buffington.

Oakley was having a lot of trouble moving the ball on the ground during the first quarter. Besides not moving forward they were also caught in the backfield by Travis Hilt in a sack that put them in a third-and-18 position.

Sainty again could not score and Oakley took the ball in for the first touchdown just before halftime. They could not add the two conversion points but had a 6-0 lead.

The game belonged to Sainty the first half of the third quarter. They had a long drive and with 5:48 on the clock Buffington went in for six points and then added the two conversion points for an 8-6 Sainty advantage. Sainty had worked their combination of runners and a solid line to move down the field. During this time they kept the drive going with a successful fourth down rushing play

The Indians continued moved the ball throughout the game but never again found the end zone. Oakley was Dallas Walz 3, Jonathan Roelfs 2, taking to the air when they had trouble moving the ball on the ground and they found some success gaining 95-yard over the evening.


