Bandel Home Center owners, Eric and Leslie Hook, at 204 N. Quincy, St. Francis, are liquidating their stock starting Thursday. In six weeks, the doors to the business will close and the owners will reopen after the first of the year with a painting and decorating shop.
"We decided that we wanted to downsize and specialize in something we really enjoyed doing," Mr. Hook said. "But we didn't want to just close the business," added Mrs. Hook. "By liquidating part of the business it will let other businesses handling the same items to grow and every business that remains open will help the community."
The decision to downsize came after the Hooks finally had time to slip away for a vacation and they realized that they were going four different ways at one time. They felt like, if they would centralize their efforts, they

would be able to better serve their customers and have more fun doing it.
The plans for the new shop are still sketchy but it will offer a variety of paints and samples of techniques. They plan to hold some workshops and add some other items.
Most impressive will be the computer which will allow the customer to take a digital photo, enter it into the computer and then "paint" it with different colors. The customer will know exactly what the outside of their house or a room will look like painted in different colors.
"It's a cool deal," Mr. Hook said. "It will be a 'premiere' place to buy paint." "The new shop will open after the holidays when people are looking for an inexpensive way to make some changes in their home and we will be able to provide the materials for it," Mrs. Hook said.
