

Money available for livestock program

Agriculture Secretary Ann M. Veneman announced that approximately \$752 million is being made available for a new Livestock Compensation Program. The Livestock Compensation Program is available for cattle, sheep, goats, buffalo and beefalo producers in counties that have received primary disaster designation due to drought in 2001 and 2002. Signup began Oct. 1 with payments being made soon after signup.

Producers must certify the numbers in each category. Livestock had to be owned for at least 90 days including the date of June 1, 2002. The stockers need to have weighed 500 pounds or more on June 1, 2002. The need to be divided between heifers, steers, and bulls less than 2 years old on June 1. Cows had to have gone through a calving cycle by June 1 and bulls had to be 2 years old or older by June 1.

Visit your local Farm Service Agency office for program details and to request assistance. Producers can also visit the United States Department of Agriculture web site (<http://www.fsa.usda.gov/>) to learn more about the program.

Motorcross racer Austin Green raced in the Ponca City, Okla., Grand National Championship July 30 through Aug. 3. He placed first in the first heat and second in the second heat in the 125-Stock Beginner Class, coming out with a second place overall win. He received first in the first heat and third in the second heat in the 125-modified Beginners Class, with sec-

ond place overall.

In order to qualify for the event, Austin had to run in both the Lakewood and Colorado Springs races and finish with a 10th place or better against 39-40 other riders, who are some of the best in the Midwest.

The weekend of Aug. 10, Austin returned to Lakewood with the pros and took third in the Novice Class. The next big race for Austin was held in Brush, Colo., in the Amateur Nationals where he raced Novice.

Austin is 14 years old and the son of David and Dana Green of Gem and the grandson of Judy Castle of Denver and Merlin and Dixie Green of Ludell. He is the great-grandson of the late Avis Byers. Mrs. Byers had been a member of the Bird City community.

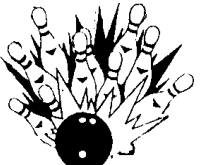

Cheyenne County is having a Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day on **October 26, 2002 from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m.** at the Cheyenne County Landfill.

Materials accepted include paints, solvents, cleaners, pesticides, aerosol cans, batteries and used oil. Automobile lead acid batteries will be accepted. Please have the materials in sturdy boxes for easy and quick unloading. Have your used oil in disposable containers. Please dispose of empty paint cans and dried paint in your dumpster for disposal in a landfill. Appliances, tires, yard waste, explosives, medical waste or radioactive waste will not be accepted. Program organizers reserve the right to reject delivery of materials.

Participants are asked to leave all materials in their original containers. If the container is leaking, pack the container "as is" in another larger container and label it clearly. If another container is used, be sure it is clearly labeled. Do not mix the contents of different containers. Securely package materials before transporting. Keep waste away from children and animals until disposed. Do not carry open containers of liquids with strong odors or spill potential in a closed automobile. Pack the containers so they won't tip break or spill during travel. Waste oil should not contain gasoline, solvents, degreasers, paint or antifreeze.
