Team up for Fire Safety; three simple steps to a safer home

What three simple steps can you take to make your home safer? According to Royce Cook, Cheyenne County Farm Bureau Safety Chairman, "The steps are easy! Fire safety is everyone's problem. That's the message we hope to pass along with the theme "Team Up for Fire Safety."

According to the National Fire Protection Association, every household should have working smoke alarms on each floor of their

home, and outside the sleeping area. Test alarms once a month, replace batteries at least once per year and replace smoke alarms at least every 10 years.

Develop and practice a home fire escape plan. Each room should have two ways to escape. Be sure and identify a meeting place outside to wait for the fire department.

Look for home safety hazards on a regular basis. You may be surprised to find unattended

candles or fireplaces without screens or an overflowing ashtray. Correct the hazards immediately.

Look out for lead

Susan Roelfs, Cheyenne County Health Nurse, reminds resident that Lead Prevention Week is Oct. 20 through Oct. 26. Information concerning lead is printed below and to learn more about lead poisoning prevention contact the Kansas Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program at 1-866-UnleadedKS, or contact the Cheyenne County Health Department at 332-2381 for a lead test.

Lead poisoning is one of the most common and preventable pediatric health problems affecting Kansas children. According to the 2000 census data, about 265,000 Kansas children are in the at-risk age group of 6 to 72 months. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates about 4.4 percent of children in the at-risk age group have blood lead levels above 10ug/dL. That equates to approximately 11,600 Kansas children. The impact of lead poisoning

on children is real, but silent, as it damages their brains and limits their abilities. A blood lead test is the only way to tell if a child has an elevated blood level and is recommended as part of a standard pediatric check-up.

Lead is a highly toxic metal that produces a range of adverse health effects particularly in young children. There are many ways in which humans are exposed to lead: through deteriorating paint and dust, air, drinking water, food and contaminated soil. Airborne lead enters the body when you breathe or swallow lead particles or dust once it has settled. Lead can leach into drinking water from certain types of plumbing materials (lead pipes, copper pipes with lead solder, and brass faucets). In addition, lead can also be found on walls, woodwork, and the outside of your home in the form of lead-based paint. Lead can be deposited on floors, windowsills, eating and playing surfaces, or in the dirt outside the home during remodeling and renovations.

The older a house is, the more likely it is to contain lead. About two-thirds of the homes built before 1940, and one-half of the homes built from 1940 to 1960 contain lead-based paint. Some homes built after 1960 but before 1978 may also contain lead paint. The only way to know if a house has lead paint is to contact a certified lead hazard professional for an in-

spection. Most paint made after 1978 contains no intentionally added lead, since the Consumer and Product Safety Commission banned it from use on the interior and exterior of homes. Even though leaded gasoline is seldom used today, high levels of lead found in soil can be attributed to past emissions. Children can swallow harmful amounts of lead if they play in the dirt or in dusty areas (even indoors) and then put their fingers, clothes, or toys in their mouths, or if they eat without first washing their hands.

Exposure to excessive levels of lead can cause brain damage; affect a child's growth; damage kidneys; impair hearing; cause vomiting, headaches, and appetite loss; and cause learning and behavioral problems. In adults, lead can increase blood pressure and can cause digestive problems, kidney damage, nerve disorders, sleep problems, muscle and joint pain, and mood changes. Fetuses, infants, and children are more vulnerable to lead exposure than adults since lead is more easily absorbed into growing bodies. Also, the tissues of small children are more sensitive to the damaging effects of lead.

If you live in a pre-1978 home and have children live in or regularly visit your home have it inspected for lead and learn about the Kansas Pre-Renovation Lead Rule before you remodel.

Can breast cancer be prevented? At this time, there is no way to prevent breast cancer. A woman's best strategy is to reduce her known risk factors whenever possible by increasing activity, reducing alcohol intake and avoiding obesity.

How is breast cancer detected early? The most important physical symptom of breast cancer is a painless mass. Up to 10 percent of patients, however have breast pain and no mass. Less common symptoms include persistent changes to the breast, such as thickening, swelling, skin irritation or distortion, and nipple symptoms, including spontaneous discharge, erosion, inversion or tenderness. Early breast cancer, when it is most treatable, typically does not produce any symptoms.

It is, therefore, very important for women to follow recommended guidelines for finding breast cancer early.

Early detection of breast cancer greatly improves the treatment options, the chances of successful treatment, and survival.

American Cancer Society guidelines for the early detection of breast cancer include three types of examinations, mammography, clinical breast examination and breast self-examination.

These guidelines are for women with no symptoms of breast cancer and who have not been identified to be at significantly higher risk. Age 20 through 39 need clinical breast examinations every three years with monthly breast self-examination. Age 40 plus should have annual mammogram, clinical breast examination and monthly breast self-examination.

The health department can assist eligible women with the Free to Know Program (Kansas Breast and Cervical Cancer Initiative). Call 332-2381 to see if you qualify.

Parents and Anger

As much as parents would like to be in charge and in control of their children, it is just not possible to be a perfect parent. Wouldn't it be great if children obeyed and behaved well all the time! The reality is that brothers and sisters fight, babies cry, and toddlers say "no". Add in the stresses of daily life, as well as a lack of enough sleep, and parents can feel overwhelmed and react angrily. Anger is a normal reaction, but can often be misplaced when adults are dealing with children. Consider the following:

Ask yourself if the anger is a legitimate reaction to the child's behavior, or the result of something else, such as problems at work or other stressors.

Take time to stop and cool off before you say or do something you regret. Get control of your feelings by slowly counting to 10 or stepping into another room or outside for a few minutes.

Look at the situation and try to determine what is really happening. Talk it over with those involved. Use "I" statements rather than "you" statements. For example say, "I am very upset about this." Instead of "You make me so angry!"

Decide who owns the problem, you or the child. Allowing a child to take responsibility for their actions is a good learning experience.

Problem solve; determine possible solutions and follow through.

Avoid lecturing and lengthy explanations; keep your comments short and to the point. Take time for further discussion after everyone is calmed down and the situation in control.

Try not to take everything personally that a child says or does. Let them know how you feel, then suggest better ways for them to react or respond.

It is important for children to understand that anger is a normal human emotion experienced by them as well as adults. Everyone involved will feel better when they are in better control of those emotions. Learning how to express anger in a positive manner is a skill needed throughout life.
