The total cost of the project would have ran around \$350,000 with the Enhancement Grant paying 80 percent of the amount leaving the city's share around \$50,000. The project would also require a consulting engineer which would cost between \$1,500 and \$2,000, meeting with property owners adjacent to the island, plus the upkeep of the islands once the project was complete.
