Archery hunters can help with contribution to disease study

Chronic Wasting Disease is a disease Colby. "This year we have a facility to of the nervous system in deer and elk. The disease has been documented in northeast Colorado, southeast Wyoming and southwest Nebraska. To date the disease has not been found in the Kansas deer herd. One captive elk near Anthony however did test positive last year.

For the past several years the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks has collected deer heads from rifle hunters in an attempt to monitor this disease. Most of this collection and testing has been in the western onethird of the state. This year the department plans to collect 1,200 deer heads statewide and since northwest Kansas is closest to areas known to have the disease, plans are to collect 300 heads from this corner of the state.

Recently, the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks officials have learned that the heads can be frozen and thawed out at a later date to collect the brainstem, which is the part of the deer that is actually tested for the disease. Previously it was thought that the freezing and thawing process destroyed the evidence.

"We have not ask the archery hunters in the past to offer their deer heads for this study since the sample size would be very small in comparison plus the man power and time needed to collect the samples would be too great and Crockett club as well as other big for a small sample size," said Leonard game organizations and contains the

freeze some heads and thaw them out later when it is more practical to take the sample.'

If any archery deer hunter would like to have his/her deer tested contact the Department of Wildlife & Parks in Colby at 785-462-3367. The time between kill and getting it into the freezer is critical. If left unfrozen for more than about 1 day decomposition starts and the sample becomes useless. It should be bagged in a trash sack and tagged with the hunter's name, address and phone number on it. "This information is needed so that should we find a positive deer we can get back with the hunter and find out exactly where the deer came from," Hopper said. "If you have freezer space that can be used for this put it in the freezer until it can be transferred to the Wildlife and Parks freezer in Colby. If this is not an option put it in a cool place and we can try to get it the next day.

"Hopefully we will never find a positive Chronic Wasting Disease deep in Kansas but we need to make a strong effort to document the absence or presents of this disease."


