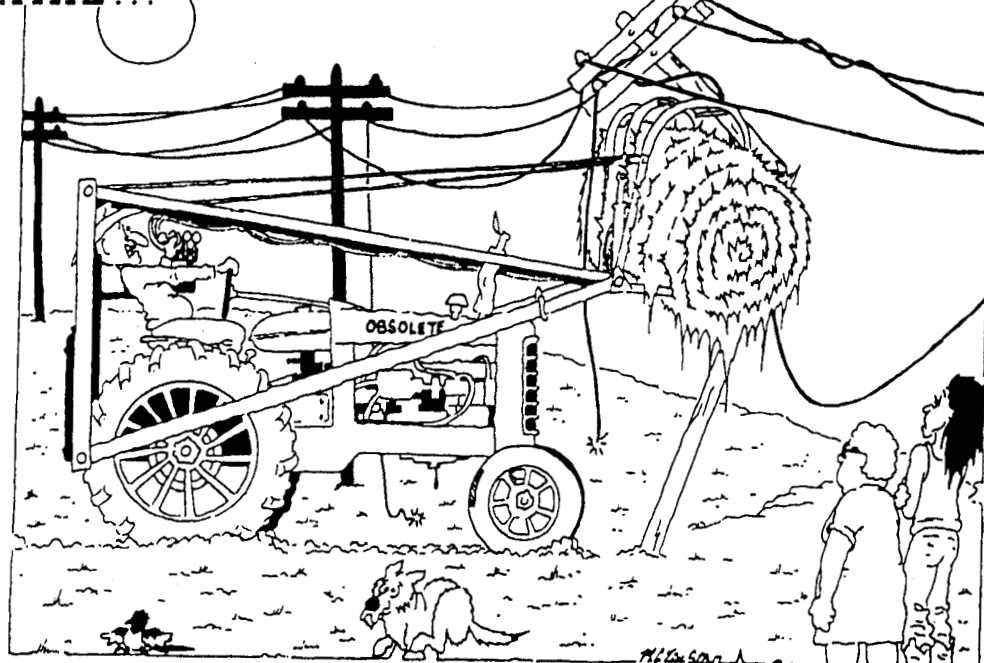

# Obituaries

## Robert L. Irvin

Dec. 8, 1926 - Oct. 26, 2002

Robert L. Irvin, a longtime Sherman County farmer, died Saturday, Oct. 26, 2002, at Hays Medical Center.

He was born Dec. 8, 1926, on the family farm on the Sherman and Cheyenne county line, the son of Evelyn Jaquetta (Reed) and Elmer B. Irvin. After graduating from Bird City High School, he joined the United States Army and served his country in Korea. He attended Denver University and returned to Sherman County to pursue his lifelong love of farming. He was a licensed pilot and enjoyed flying.

On Feb. 21, 1950, he and Dolly Clawson were united in marriage in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. He purchased a farm south of Ruelton, where they resided for next 16 years. It was one of the first irrigated farms in Sherman County. His farming operation continued to grow and during the 1970s, he was honored as one of the top sugar beet growers for several years. The family moved into Goodland in 1966 where he lived until moving to the Good Samaritan Center one year ago due to his health.

He was saved and then baptized in the Smokey River in 1955 and attended Calvary Gospel Church and Word of Life Church. His memberships included lifetime Veterans of Foreign Wars, Lowell Coleman Post 1133.

Preceding him in death were his parents. Surviving family members include his wife Dolly Irvin of Goodland, four daughters Terri Richardson and her husband Terry of Goodland, Reva Bauman and her husband Jerry of Goodland; Sonia Stallard and her husband Charlie of Colorado Springs; Lori Connorton and her husband Terry of Moore, S.C.; seven grandchildren; two great-grandchildren; one brother Vernon Irvin and his wife Iris of Goodland; one sister Mary Brown of Mesa Ariz., and his beloved dog Ralph.

Funeral services were held Tuesday, Oct. 29, at Calvary Gospel Church, Goodland, with Pastor Steve

Rains officiating. Burial will follow in the Goodland Cemetery.

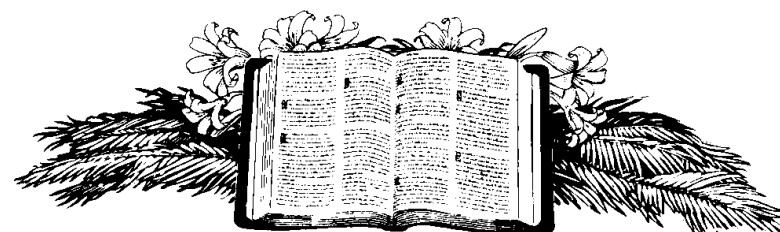
