Representative defends seat by winning

Brewster farmer and Republican legislator John Faber defended his seat in the Kansas House on Nov. 5, beating Democratic challenger Bob Strevey of Norcat 5,441-2,742 statewide.

Mr. Faber has held the 120th District legislative seat for six years. In August, he fought a successful primary campaign against Doug Sebelius of Norton, winning by a narrow margin.

On Tuesday, he ran especially strong in the west end of the district, his home base. Mr. Faber took Decatur County 836 to 582, Phillips County 1,270 to 658, Cheyenne County 987 to 224, Rawlins County 1,226-334 and Norton County 1,122-944.

"It's been quite a summer for me with two campaigns," Mr. Faber said from his Brewster farmhouse, "but I enjoy getting out in the district and talking to folks."

"Bob Strevey's a good man, and he ran a good campaign."

Mr. Strevey had no primary opponent. This was his first time to seek state office. He ran because, he said, he strongly believes in the two-party system and getting involved.

After hearing the results, Mr. Strevey said that he knew it was difficult to win against an incumbent. He said he thought Mr. Faber was a class act.

"It's been a lot of fun to be a part of the process," he said. "I thoroughly enjoyed myself and I think we re-energized the parties a little bit."

In the Board of Education race, Mrs. Morris, a teacher from St. Francis, beat Mr. Rundell in the primary. Mr. Rundell, who had held the state seat for 14 years, decided to mount a write-in campaign and seemed to have the support of school boards and administrators.

The effort was too little, too late, however, as Mrs. Morris stumped the

area with gubernatorial candidate Tim Shallenburger and showed up at school board meetings and functions.

Still, Mr. Rundell was able to garner 207 write-in votes in Decatur County while Mrs. Morris had 988 people check her box on the ballot.

In Cheyenne County, Mrs. Morris beat Mr. Rundell 628-390, in Phillips County 1,328-383, Rawlins County 1,156-185 and Norton County 1,515-271.

"I'm excited and honored and really anxious to get busy," Mrs. Morris said

from her home in Cheyenne County. "I started out to do what I could to make education better for our children. I'm ready to go."

Mrs. Morris said she wanted to raise the salaries for teachers and help bring more economic development to western Kansas.

Mr. Rundell could not be reached for comment.

In Rawlins County, a 14-mill tax increase for the hospital passed 949 to 676.

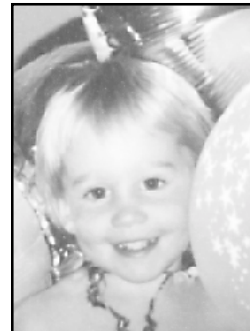
