Bi-district loss ends 2002 football season

ineup on Tuesday night when the Tigers of Stockton scored a 27-6 victory. In this bi-district playoff-game, only the winner could advance to regionals on Saturday.

"I wished we would have played better," Coach Tim Lambert said. "It was a tough way to end the year. We didn't play as well as we could have.

Seniors playing their final game for the Indians include: Cale Rieger, Tyler Wolters, Marcus Dodd, Justin Lindsten, Travis Hilt, Dallas Walz, Brian Draper and Chase Collier. These young men, during their four years of high school football, saw St. Francis earn a 34 to 8 record.

"All year long was an up-and-down season," Coach Lambert said. "Consistency was a problem. It got us in the end. We could play at a high level but couldn't do it for an extended period of time."

The first quarter Tuesday was an excellent example of a defensive football game. Only three first downs (St. Francis 2, Stockton 1) were made as neither team could move the ball for an extended drive.

Derek Ross of St. Francis caused the only turnover of the period when he picked off a Stockton pass midway through the quarter giving the Indians their best field position of the quarter.

A total of six punts were necessary during the 12 minutes due to the low amount of yards gained by either team. On one occasion St. Francis didn't punt on a fourth-and-two situation and this proved successful when Michael Raile made just the amount needed. Unfortunately the Indians found it necessary to punt on their next fourth-down play. The second quarter saw both offen-

sive units swing into action.

St. Francis opened the quarter with a fourth-and-eighth situation and they elected to pass. Although the pass was incomplete, Stockton was called for pass interference and all of a sudden St. Francis was on the Tiger 14-yard line. The first down play moved them down to the 5-yard line but then St. Francis was called for holding on the next play received a face mask penalty on the ton 27, St. Francis 6.

next play which put St. Francis on the St. Francis moved out of the playoff 1-yard line. From there Ross carried the ball in for the first score of the game. The conversion attempt failed but the Indians had a 6-0 advantage with 10:30 on the clock.

During the next 6 minutes Stockton controlled the ball and moved it steadily downfield, collecting five first downs along the way. The clock showed 3:52 when a pass play put them in the end zone for six points. A successful kick added the conversion point making it Stockton 7, St. Francis 6. The Tigers had used both the ground and the air to sustain their drive.

Jonathan Roelfs took the kickoff and the Indians began play on their own 21yard line with the offense finding ways to gain some vardage. They moved into Stockton territory with three first downs but the clock was moving toward halftime. On the next series four passes were attempted unsuccessfully and the Indians were forced to turn the ball over with 1:49 remaining.

Stockton failed on a fourth down attempt giving the Indians the ball with seconds left. When the buzzer sounded Stockton held a slim 7-6 advantage after one half of play.

Stockton picked up an additional score on their first series of plays in the third quarter. They went from the Stockton 27yard line to the St. Francis end zone in 3 minutes. The big plays included a 38yard pass that moved them into St. Francis territory and a fourth-and onetouchdown pass for 27 yards.
