Firearms deer season appears to have brought out the worst

Well, firearms deer season is over for 2002. I got mixed reports from hunters but the general mood was that not as many deer were seen and the hunting was a bit tougher this year. The entire deer season was relatively mild and the last weekend was actually too warm. It was nice to be out but the deer were scattered.

Almost all Wildlife and Parks personnel are happy to see the season end, not to mention many landowners. It seems once again, we had a world of trespass complaints, a lot of road hunting activity and lots of tickets written. Deer hunting seems to bring out the worst in some hunters and hunter ethics just fly out the window. We are all amazed every year how many hunters feel that driving a vehicle until they spot a deer is the right way to hunt or using a 4-wheeler to pursue and chase deer is okay.

Most of the trespass complaints were from landowners who have land away from the home farmstead. They purchased deer permits and found that other hunters, if you can call them that, had trespassed on their land before they even got there to hunt. Vehicle tracks through Conservation Reserve Program land and the Walk-In Hunting areas were evident everywhere. We were all amazed at the numbers of deer that were left lay, some with the heads cut off and lots of smaller pucks just shot and left with vehicle tracks right up to the deer.

We also had quite a bit of poaching activity this year right before and through the season. The law enforcement personnel were kept quite busy working both daytime and nighttime complaints. The presence of bigger bucks brings out the worst in the poachers, too. Lots of the deer simply had the antlers cut off and the rest was left to waste. The conservation officers spent quite a few hours with planes in the air and the bobdeer (decoys) got a real workout. Numerous tickets were written for spotlighting but lots of complaints could not be responded to because of lack of manpower and hours in a day.

There were several really bad situations. One grandfather was caught shooting at a decoy deer with his 13-year-old grandson along — what kind of example is that setting? A number of youngsters were riding around at night with some of those spotlighting. It is no wonder our deer season is turning into one of the most illegal and unethical of the hunting seasons! It makes one wonder whether the kids paid any attention to their Hunter Education classes or if they even took them.

Hunters, if we do not get our deer hunting under control, all of our hunting seasons will be in jeopardy in the future. Lots of folks do not hunt but they support those of us who do. Then there is the anti-hunting element. If our deer seasons continue to degrade in sportsmanship and ethical behavior, more of the general public will view all

hunters as they do deer hunters. We've got to clean up our act and there just aren't enough law enforcement officers to go around. Each and every one of us must get involved by turning in the poachers, not tolerating unethical hunting behavior amongst our friends and relatives, and certainly teaching our youngsters the right ways to hunt deer.

I went back and looked at several articles I wrote years ago about this time and it is remarkable how similar they were. One conservation officer wrote in his weekly report this past week, "I have lost all hope in humanity again." Think what a tough job those guys have at this time of year. For heaven's sakes, if you see a spotlight at night, call your local conservation office or call the county sheriff's office. If you see an illegal deer hanging somewhere, call us with the location. One of these days, we are going to be back to one deer permit per person, perhaps a drawing system for all permits, and a limited season in which to hunt if we do not give our deer herd a reasonable chance.

I certainly hope that this deer season will be a learning experience for many of our Kansas deer hunters. I am sure a lot of you saw some illegal activity, some unethical behavior and a good dose of unsportsmanlike conduct. If our hunting seasons are to continue, we are all going to have to work together to gain back control of our firearms deer season.

Woman receives award

of Public Health and Environment and director of University Hospital's Department of Emergency Medicine. Dr. Honigman was honored with a special award as a major contributor to the advancement of the state's Emergency Medical and Trauma Services System.
