Lady Indians finish in sixth place

Atwood came roaring back in the fourth quarter Saturday to overcome the St. Francis lead and take the consolation championship of the Oberlin Invitational. St. Francis finished in the sixth position. In the final placings, Cambridge,

Neb., finished first, Hoxie second, Republican Valley third, Dundy County, Neb., fourth, Atwood fifth, St. Francis, sixth, Oberlin, seventh and Quinter, eighth.

Representing St. Francis in the free-throw contest were Toni Rice and Allyse Lampe, with neither making the finals.

Samantha Coates and Kelsey Andrist were named to the All-Tournament Team and Dennon Zimbelman made the All-Academic Team. St. Francis was defeated by Re-

publican Valley 50-44 in the opening round on Tuesday. Friday saw the Lady Indians defeat Quinter 55-27 before being outscored by Atwood 40-29.

Republican Valley 50, St. Francis 44

In the opening round of the tournament St. Francis fell to Republican Valley 50-44, putting the Lady Indians on the consolation side of the bracket.

"We played very well on the defensive end of the floor," Coach Busse said. "We moved the ball well on the offensive end, but just couldn't get the easy shots to fall!"

Offensively Republican Valley attempted only 39 two-point shots and made 23 of them for 59 percent while St. Francis attempted 50 and made only 15 for 30 percent. St. Francis made three of the 15 threepoint shots they attempted for 20 percent. Hitting the three's were Toni Rice, Amber Feikert and Samantha Coates.

Coates had the best shooting percentage from the field (5-of-6 for 83.3 percent) and was also the leading scorer with 14 points while Gina Frohlich added 11. Kelsey Andrist was perfect from the free-throw line with 3-of-3. St. Francis did better at the line but had only nine opportu-
