Signs could cost \$4,000

The St. Francis Area Chamber of Commerce members have been discussing the "Welcome" signs on either side of St. Francis for over a year but it is a big project which will cost between \$3,500 and \$4,000.

Sign painters say that when a sign deteriorates, the sign keeps advertising but it gives a different message and the Chamber does not want that kind of message coming

Unfortunately, there is not that much money in the Chamber's funds. In the late summer, the Chamber hosted a garden tour and during the Christmas season, tickets were sold and a drawing was held for a 19-inch television. These fund raisers brought in \$837 and there is still a long way to go before there is enough money for the signs.

The signs will be a vinyl material and, unlike traditional signs, these signs will have the ability to display photographic images. The first signs using the vinyl material will need some special structure construction and will last around four years. The vinyl signs are less expensive than the older signs which would have needed boards replaced, primed and then have the design painted on. Vinyl signs will have basically the same life span that
