By Betty Jean Winston Nine St. Francis wrestlers qualified for State by placing in the top four at the Regional Tournament held in Lakin on Feb. 21-22 and three of these wrestlers come home from the 3-2-1A State Tournament in Hays on Saturday with medals.

Dylan Loyd, 112 pounds, advanced to the finals and was defeated by Younkin of Oakley by a 3-2 decision, thus placing second.

At 160 pounds, Derek Ross finished in third place after winning his final four matches.

The other St. Francis wrestler to place was Trevor Richard at 103 pounds. He finished the tournament with a 4-2 record.

Loyd and Richard are freshmen while Ross is a sophomore.

"We were encouraged by the St. Francis fans," Coach Larry Gabel said. "We appreciate them being willing to drive all that way to support the wrestlers and coaching staff."

St. Francis finished the tough tournament in ninth place with 62.5 points. Hoxie ran away with the event by scoring 218.5 points and having three champions. Additional team placings and tournament champions are listed below.
