Senator visits **Bird** City

by Casey McCormick Bird City hosted Kansas State Senator Stan Clark and State Representative John Faber for a town meeting on Saturday. Cheyenne County residents met at the Senior Citizen's Center to have coffee and donuts and share direct contact with their representatives in Topeka. Senator Karen Brownlee had been expected too but could not come due to illness.

Rep. Faber spoke first, thanking the voters for their support in the last election. He talked about Governor Sebelius and her attempt to raise fees on transportation which he voted against. Rep. Faber also touched on key issues of education consolidation and doing away with magistrate judges. Neither of these down sizing ideas have been presented for a vote and it is unsure if they will go that far.

Senator Clark began his time with a discussion of the state budget and how it effects Cheyenne County. He said that there is a need for rural development but first the area leaders must focus on what the goals should be and then have a clear plan on how to implement them.

Payments for unshorn pelts

pelts is now eligible for loan deficiency payments under provisions of the 2002 Farm Bill. Eligible producers have until March 31 to apply for loan deficiency payments for unshorn pelts produced during the 2002 crop year.

Angie Berens, County Executive Director of the Cheyenne County Farm Service Agency, said loan deficiency payments would be available for the 2002 through 2007 crop years to producers who meet the agency's eligibility requirements.

To be eligible for a loan deficiency payment for unshorn pelts, producers must have beneficial interest in the pelts, owned the lamb for at least 30 calendar days before the date of slaughter, or slaughter the unshorn lamb for personal use. Producers must also comply with

A second exception to the beneficial interest rule has been granted to eligible producers who lost beneficial interest between Jan. 1 and Feb. 21 of the 2003 crop year. Requests for loan deficiency payments based on this exception must be submitted no later than march 31.

Loan deficiency payments for unshorn lamb pelts are calculated by multiplying the "effective loan deficiency payment rate" by 6.865, the standard weight for an unshorn pelt. The result is then multiplied by the number of pelts to determine the total payment amount.

The effective loan deficiency payment rate for pelts is determined by subtracting the regional posted price for ungraded wool from the regional 2002-03 loan rate. The 2002-2003 loan price for ungraded wool in Region 2, which includes Kansas, is \$.40 per pound. Regional posted prices for graded and ungraded wool and mohair are announced every Tuesday at 3 p.m. eastern time.
