
University honors students

She was born in 1908 to George and Pearl Brown in eastern Colorado where her parents homesteaded. In 1911, the family moved to Haigler, Neb., where her father bought the livery barn and drayline.

Vinnette and her brother Leonard (both were born the same year) started school in the schoolhouse in the southwest part of town.

In about 1917, the family moved to Vinnette's grandfathers. This area is called Clough Valley and is northwest of St. Francis. She stayed with her grandparents her freshman year as they had moved into Haigler. The next year, her parents purchased the Farmer's Store in Haigler with living quarters above the store where they lived until they purchased a house in town. Her father stayed on the farm and her mother managed the store.

In 1925, Vinnette married Harry Faylor and both worked in the store until her parents decided to sell out and go back to the farm.

Harry and Vinnette farmed east of Haigler for awhile and that was where their first child Joan was born. Soon after, they moved southwest of Haigler to a farm Vinnette's father had purchased. That was where their son Dale was born. they then purchased a farm about 11 miles north of Haigler. They didn't have a car part of the time and Vinnette rode a horse to the Extension Club meeting and brother and sister were drowned in the

Vinnette Faylor celebrated her they drove a team and wagon to town. Harry's uncle finally bought them a Model TFord because he didn't think they should be that far from town with two small children without better transportation.

It was during the Great Depression and they were unable to keep the farm. In the spring of 1933, they headed for Oregon driving a Maxwell car pulling a homemade plywood trailer house that Harry built. It was a novelty in those days and created a lot of attention. They had lights from the car while traveling and when they camped, they had kerosene lamps, stove and an oven to cook with. It had double bunks for sleeping and a pulldown table. One novel feature was a "cellar" under the trailer between the wheels which was filled with homecanned meat, lard and anything else they had on hand. When they returned from Oregon, those same jars were filled with fruit.

Harry worked at all kinds of jobs and Vinnette worked some in the fruit and cooked for some men during hop harvest.

They returned to the midwest in 1934. It was still during the Dust Bowl years and Depression time so they decided to go to the mountains of Colorado as it was nearer to home.

The cabin they were living in burned to the ground with all their possessions. That same year, Memorial weekend 1935, Harry's parents,

Republican River. The bodies were never found.

In 1940, they returned to the Haigler area and moved to a farmranch 3 miles south of Haigler in Cheyenne County. The kids attended school in Haigler and the family went to the Haigler Methodist Church.

Harry's health became poor so they moved to Arizona for one winter. Then they moved to California where they were hotel and apartment house managers in the bay area and at Stanford University until they retired in 1970. They moved to Boonville, Calif. where Vinnette did lots of oil painting.

Harry died in 1999. In 2001, son Dale and granddaughter Daneen moved Vinnette back to Kansas because she could no longer live alone. She had been living with Dale and wifeDodeuntilaboutamonthagowhen she because a resident of the Good Samaritan Village in St. Francis.

Vinnette had seven grandchildren, 17 great-grandchildren and 10 greatgreat-grandchildren with another due in about two months.
