• Needlework — Again, there are numerous classes where people can enter items. No person can enter more than two articles in a division and it may be necessary for the per-

• Foods — Items for this division must be homemade and no person shall enter more than one item from the same baking. All foods, with the exception of pies and canned food will be sold at the bake sale at 12:30 on Thursday.

• Preservations — Food should Names and address of the person be canned in either pints or quarts except for jams and jellies.

 Miscellaneous floriculture – Exhibitor must grow all entries and all specimens are to be displayed in glass bottles (brown is preferred). There are also divisions in dish gardens; spikes spray; stalk; terrariums and blooms.

Other open class divisions include the pet show, cow/calf show, lamb show, bucket calves and the wheat show.
