## Club celebrates 40 years of activities and trips

Dee Fries, tour guide, joined the caravan at Benkelman. After a rest stop at the Benkelman Quick Stop, it was on to Wauneta, Neb., for more pop and goodies.

On leaving Wauneta the group drove by the Wauneta Flour Mill, moving toward the north side of the Frenchman for a scenic drive on the old highways to Champion, where sack lunches were enjoyed at the Mill

Bill Silvester and daughter joined the group at the Mill, after which they drove to the Silvester Farm 8 miles southwest, to visit with Bill's three Donkules. A tour of the "roomy" Silvester earth house afforded participants a chance to admire some outstandingly gorgeous dolls and other art productions made by Bill's late wife and his daughter. Back in Champion, a guided tour of the Mill was taken, the men of the club taking special interest in the mechanics and workings of the antiquated machinery and equipment.

At the Chase County Museum, the group was greeted by several ladies, including Jeanine Cox, a former club member, who later accompanied the group to her home to see her husband Arlyn's refurbished, better than new condition, antique car collection.

Club tours have always been major activities for the Tri-State Antique Auto Club family.

On Sunday afternoon, Sept. 5, 1962, a strange and unique occurrence was taking place in a vacant lot in the northwest part of McDonald. Four antique vehicles, their motors purring not smoothly, were preparing for an adventure. Soon the first Tri-State Antique Auto Tour, organized by Fred D. Magley, was underway, rolling down U.S. Highway 36. The destination was Bird City, a precarious 8 miles to the west. Fred Magley's 1925 Model T Ford Coupe, Don Hartman's 1914 Model T Ford Touring, Charles Draper's 1922 Model T Ford Truck and Orville Hartman's 1925 Model T Ford Fire Truck participated in the tour, with several persons accompanying the caravan in newer vehicles.

The second organized tour took place on Sunday, Sept. 19, 1962. That particular tour left McDonald with three antique cars, one antique fire truck and an eight motorcycle escort assembled by Duane Neitzel. Ralph Crawford, St. Francis, furnished radio communication between the front and back of the line of vehicles, using two modern pickups, one at the head of the line and one at the rear. Participants and their families were: Fred Magley, Orville Hartman, Don Hartman and Bill Fiedler. The happy group had lunch in the park at Bird City, where they were joined by Royce Smith of Stratton, Neb., in his 1931 Model A Roadster and Dr. J.H.A. Peck, St. Francis, driving his

On arrival in St. Francis, at an average speed of 25 miles per hour, those in attendance visited at Burr's Skelly Service Station where Charles Draper's 1922 Model T Ford Truck, Jim Manson's 1926 Dodge Coupe and Fred Burr's 1930 Model A Ford Coupe were on display. The last stop on the tour that day was at Dr. Peck's barn where the good doctor served refreshments in that remodeled and comfortable old building. There was talk of organizing a club at that time,

until the following spring to make the club a reality.

At 1:30 p.m. on May 13, 1963, Fred Magley's 1925 Model TFord Coupe, Ron Lillich and Larry Cross, in Fred Magley's 1928 Model A Ford Coupe and Keith Harvey, St. Francis, in his 1930 Model A Ford pickup, left Bird City and headed west to St. Francis. They were joined, near the Guy Lamb farm, 3 1/2 miles east of Wheeler, by Ralph Crawford, driving his 1926 Chevrolet Coupe, and Elmer Felzien, behind the wheel of his 1902 Rambler replica. Fred Burr, Don Hartman and Jim Manson, whose antique autos were identified earlier, also joined the party at this location.

On a cold, windy Sunday afternoon, June 9, 1963, the fourth tour, with autos driven by Fred Magley, Elmer, Don Charles, Keith, Bill (in Ralph's 1926 Chevrolet), and August Wahl of Kanorado, driving his own 1912 Detroiter Touring car, departed from Majestic Service Station, St. Francis, intending to tour to Benkelman, Neb., by way of Bird City. On reaching Bird City, those persons traveling the open vehicles were exceedingly cold, so the tour stopped for coffee at the Dairy King and decided to complete the trip to Benkelman on a nicer day.

On Sunday, July 14, 1963, Fred Magley, Don, Elmer, Bill and Royce Pettinger, driving his 1929 Ford Coupe, met at Majestic Service Station and toured to Atwood, where they visited with antique auto buffs in

A Mock Auto Show, sponsored by the car enthusiasts, was held in the then vacant lot west of Majestic Service on July 1, 1963. The vintage vehicles of regular participants: Fred Magley, Don, Keith, Fred Burr, Ralph, Jim, Elmer and Dr. Peck were on display and participated in old car games during the day. Three new antique car owners were at the show. Linden Welle of Arapahoe, Colo., displayed his 1928 Ford Coupe and was declared Champion of the Show by a popular vote. Robert Helman of Goodland brought his 1923 Model T Ford Coupe. Ken Stout, also of Goodland, brought his 1924 Model T Ford Coupe. Formation of the club was truly a climax to an outstanding day - and will long be remembered by those who took part in the first informal antique car show in the tri-state

At the second regular meeting, on Sept. 21, 1963, the 10th annual Thresher show was in full swing at the Roy Kite farm, north of Bird City, when Tri-State Antique Auto Club representatives arrived. Members of the 70-day-old club in attendance that day were: Fred Magley, Ralph Crawford, Henry Hilt and Keith Harvey. Duane Hawkins, McDonald, a prospective member, was present with his 1931 Model A Ford. Since that day, 40 years ago, the Auto Club has devoted untold hours to the successes of each yearly Thresher show and, in 1976, became an associate organization of the Thresher Associa-

Many tours and activities have occurred in the years since the Auto Club was founded. with two leaders, at Omaha, Neb., for a week-long adventure. The coordinator was Gary Husk of Fremont, Neb. The program of study was "Lewis and Clark From Omaha to Yankton.'

Next year will be the 200th anniversary of the Lewis and Clark Expedition which explored the new uncharted area of our country from St. Louis to the Pacific Ocean. President Thomas Jefferson had just purchased the Louisiana Territory, doubling the size of the United States at that time, and commissioned Captains Meriwether Lewis and William Clark to find a route to the west coast starting on the Missouri River at St. Louis. The two captains and their crew left St. Louis on May 21, 1804, and returned Sept. 23, 1806, having reached the Pacific Ocean Nov. 7, 1895.

Though they encountered many perils and hardships, only one man of the party of 28 was lost, and he died of natural causes on the long journey. He was Sergeant Charles Floyd and the Elderhostel group visited his burial site and monument near Sioux City, Iowa. It was the first registered historic landmark in
